Luke 2:1-20



I remember being in a store doing some shopping, and someone says to a friend “Christmas stinks!”

Why am I saying this? The true thing is that we have such an old-fashioned picture in our minds of what that first Christmas was like. Most of our greeting cards and nativity scenes are populated with colorful flowing images and unspoiled figures that it fools us into believing that it was an immaculate, spotless place. Well, folks, it stunk! Remember, the first Christmas was in a stable.

For those who have not been following this sermon series, I have to share with you that these past four Sundays – Sundays of Advent, we have been under a sermon series called “*Sensing Advent*.” We have been discovering how our five senses can help us to understand the coming of the little boy of Bethlehem in a better way.

We dealt with the senses of sight, hearing, touching, and at this time, I would like to invite you to experience SENSING CHRISTMAS, with the sense of SMELL!

Do you understand now when I say that Christmas Stinks?

Let me share with you, there were basically two ways people kept their livestock in those days: The first one was in their homes. Yes! In their homes. It was an inner room of the house. It means on the interior of the house was a large room full of straw, mangers and other necessities for keeping the animals. Most people weren’t rich, and their homes were very modest, and they didn’t own much livestock anyway. Therefore, they probably kept couple of sheep and goats, perhaps chickens to get fresh eggs, but not pigs...because according to Jewish tradition, pork meat was unclean.

The second way was outdoors. However, it is not what you are thinking, a big barn with livestock. No, it was normally a cave

you kidding me? Well, it was beautiful because we know it was God entering this world. It was God taking on human flesh. It was God coming to show us what he looks like, and when God showed up, he showed up in the smelliest, lowliest, darkest place on earth. It was the most beautiful fetid, stinky, smelly place on earth. The presence of Jesus transformed the dank, dark, smelly confines of a cave into a place of light, and life and love. That’s what Christmas did. That’s what Christmas is about.

Christmas means God is with us—Immanuel! God is still invading this smelly old world of ours. We know that God has

come in Jesus to transform our dark hearts made rancid by the stink of sin in our lives. We need transformation—all of us—all the time.
